Meet Tayla Cvitanich— 2019 Te Raki House Leader

My journey at Craighead began six years ago, when a shy yet ambitious Tayla stepped foot on the school grounds for the first time. Moving from a small rural primary school in Year 8 was one of the best, yet biggest transitions I have made in my life. In primary school, my Year 7 class consisted of 25 boys and just 5 girls. I was held back by the silent limitations of being a female, and I therefore lacked the confidence to step out of my comfort zone and reach my full potential.

I was instantly welcomed into the warm and encouraging atmosphere of Craighead, and it wasn't long before I began to flourish in the remarkable community it provides. I slowly began to take risks, get involved, and try new things without the fear of failure. I tried many sports including Rowing, Basketball, Volleyball, Touch, Hockey and Tennis. I joined the Choir, and started learning guitar, eventually gaining enough confidence to sing solos at the annual Music Cups and the Voices Of Craighead performances. Through the support of my teachers who were engaging, encouraging and personally invested in my progress and achievements, I stretched my academic performance and truly stepped into my potential.

What changed? I believe that what I gained at Craighead was strong and independent female role models, who helped me develop the confidence in myself as a young woman stepping out into the world. I began to see the life -changing potential every girl had inside them, and witnessed ordinary girls achieve incredible things. I have looked up to the student leaders each year and this year, stepping into a senior leadership role myself, I feel the same obligation to show younger students just what they can achieve when they set their minds on something. Being appointed House Leader of Te Raki for 2019 has been the biggest privilege, and so far the most rewarding role I have undertaken at Craighead. It has given me the chance to give back into the community that has supported me so closely in my journey through high school. Alongside my Deputy Nikita Clemens, I hope to support and inspire the younger students to take every opportunity that comes their way and never settle for anything less than their personal best. Lattitude Gap students—At this time of year, we sadly farewell our wonderful Gap students—Johanna Theilemann and Melissa Conze from Germany, and Felicity Deacon from England. These young women have become highly valued members of our staff and of the Boarding House.



We thank them for their service and contribution to school life, and wish them all the best upon their return home to begin their Tertiary studies.

The Big Sing—Hot off the press is the news that, following the regional finals, **the Craighead Chorale has gained a place in the National Big Sing Finale**, one of only five South Island choirs of the twenty-four selected. This is the premier event on the Choral Federation Calendar. Congratulations to Miss Emma Hall (a former Chorale member and now teacher of Year 7) for bringing the group up to this exacting standard, supported by both Ms Celia Liu and Mrs Julie McLean. Preparations are now underway for the Big Sing Finale, which takes place in the Dunedin Town Hall on 29-30 August.

Cadenza, the 'next best thing to The Big Sing Finale', will enable 36 competing choirs from across New Zealand to experience the buzz of a Finale-style event, with the added dimension of massed workshops with an international choral conductor, who will also perform the role of adjudicator. These two-day events, held in Rotorua, Whanganui and Timaru, will culminate in a public gala concert in each location, allowing all the choirs to showcase an item from their Cadenza repertoire and to sing together music rehearsed with the international guest. Craighead and the Theatre Royal are hosting the Timaru Cadenza on Friday and Saturday 16 and 17 August. Put these dates in your diary!
